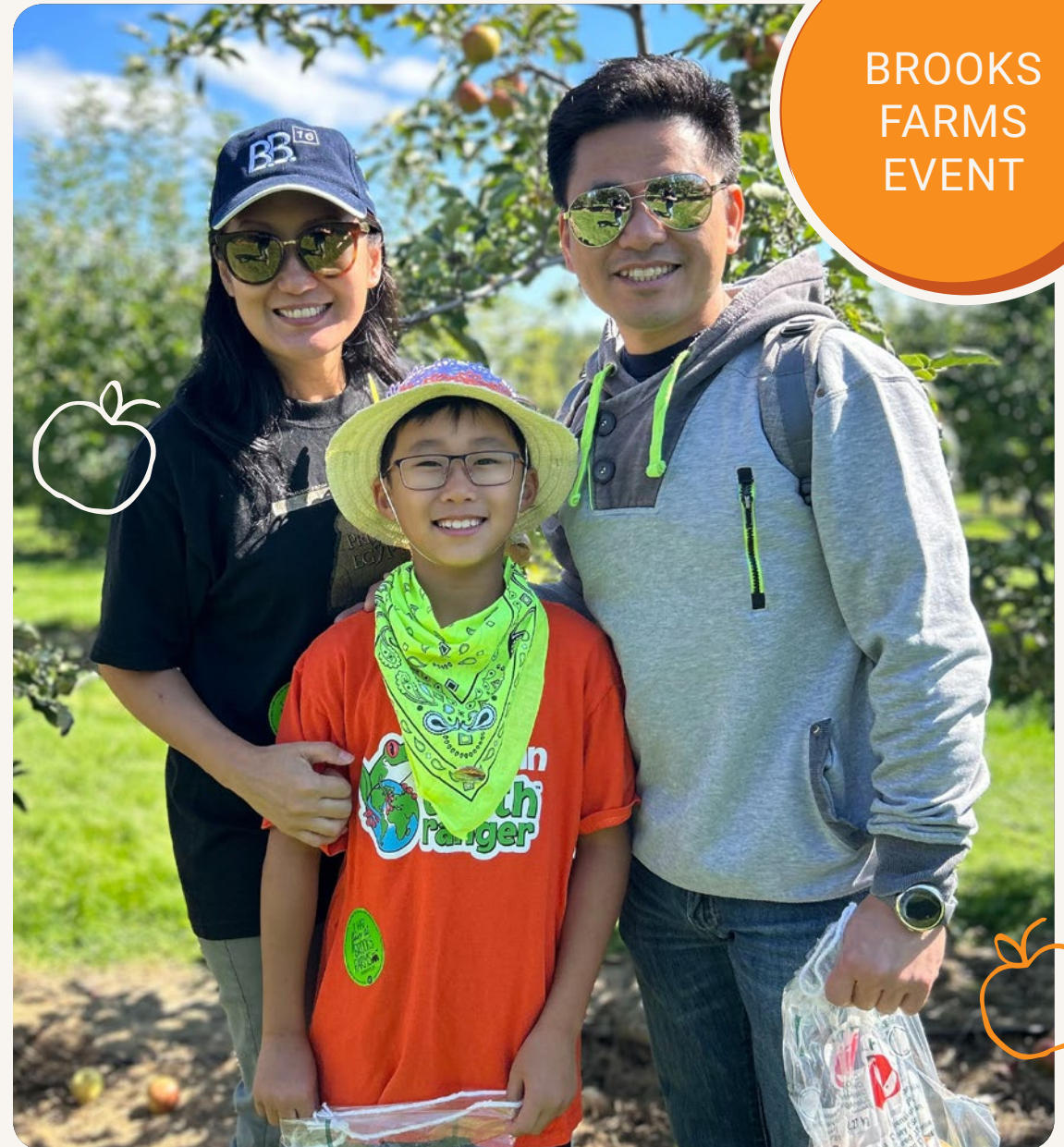


# EVENTS

## PROJECT 2050

Our Project 2050 Climate Challenges program saw thousands of children adopt GHG-reducing habits in 2023 and report on them daily in the app. Working together, they were able to reach community goals for the All Taste No Waste Challenge, Rangers Vs. Plastic, and the Gross Out Challenge! Along with the launch of our newest Challenge, The Big Splash, our members continue to blast these Challenges out of the water by logging over 447,000 habits in 2023! Some popular habits included:

Our School Assembly is one of the most important and exciting ways we reach kids! This year, the presentation took students on an interactive adventure around the world to discover unique habitats and amazing animal adaptations, while engaging in a bit of friendly competition with their peers. Whether students were on Team Bear, Team Shark, Team Goose, or Team Moose, our 2023 assemblies were a memorable and educational experience for both students and teachers!

# HOMEROOM

Earth Rangers Homeroom (and its new French counterpart, Ma Classe Éco) provides educators with a wealth of environmental education lessons and activities, with connections to local resources and curriculum-concepts. In addition, our revamped Earth Rangers Clubs program is back to support school eco-clubs and community groups every step of the way! **143 new Earth Rangers clubs signed up in 2023.**

To further support our amazing network of educators, Earth Rangers delivered three sessions of our professional development course, Eco-Anxiety to Eco-Action, in 2023 as well as individual workshops for those seeking ways to provide support to children dealing with climate anxiety.

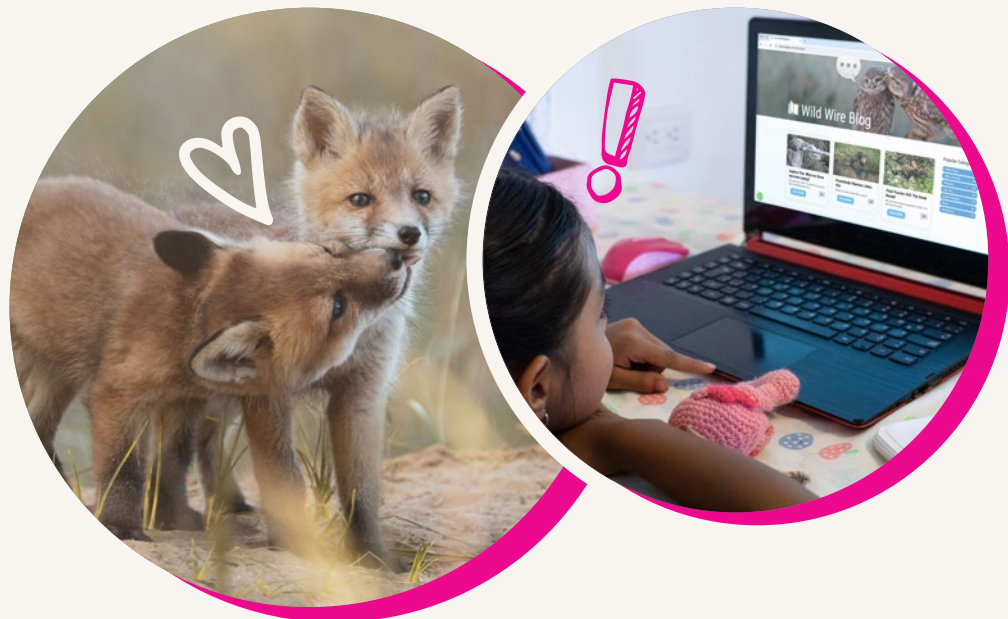

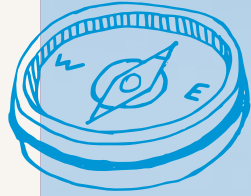

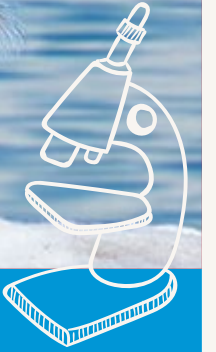
**MEGAN QUINN** is a Coordinator of Conservation Biology with the Nature Conservancy of Canada. She leads a team conducting on-the-ground work in the Frontenac Arch, an important wildlife corridor in Eastern Ontario.

**NICHOLAS PAROSHY** is a researcher from the University of Alberta, studying the changing movements of polar bear sub-populations in the Canadian Arctic due to climate change.



**KATIE FLORKO**, a University of British Columbia researcher, is studying predator-prey dynamics of ringed seals, fish, and polar bears in Hudson Bay; developing information that can be used for prediction mapping for conservation efforts.



**JULIA POETSCHKE** is a Land Stewardship Manager with the Nature Conservancy of Canada in British Columbia, who is working to restore wildlife habitat in the extraordinary Rocky Mountain Trench.



**OSA CONSERVATION** is working with local communities to protect jaguars from poachers, habitat loss, and other threats in Costa Rica's Osa Peninsula, a biodiversity hotspot.

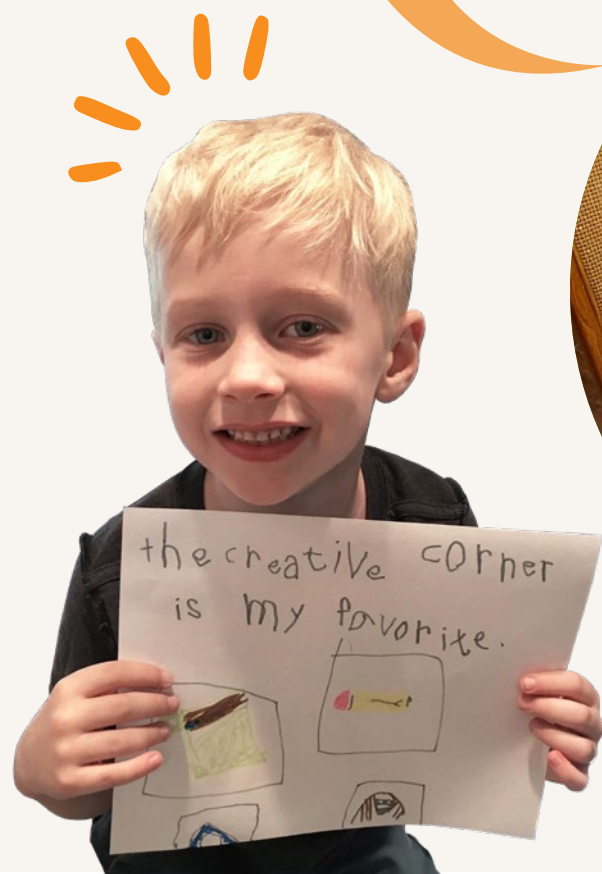

# CONTESTS

Classrooms participated in our **“What A Peculiar Animal”** contest to learn about animal adaptations, and designed their own “peculiar animal” using prompts about their habitat, food source, and predators.

Ms. Mason’s Grade 2 Class at Buena Vista School in Saskatoon won a virtual visit with an Earth Rangers Animal Ambassador!

Our **Carbon Neutrality Writing Contest** asked children to share the meaning of this important concept—and how they try to practice it in their own lives—in their own words. Whether it was how they reduce emissions, or understanding the important role of trees, submissions from across the country included thoughtful explanations and stories to help illustrate carbon neutrality.



“Carbon is a gas that comes from things like cars and factories, and it’s not good for our planet. But trees and plants are like cleaners because they take in carbon from the air...I made a cool Lego city that’s carbon neutral, which means it’s great for the Earth. My city has a garden centre where we grow and take care of lots of plants. That’s like having extra cleaners to clear our air of carbon. So, I think that being carbon neutral is a super way to help our planet and keep it nice for living things like people, animals, and plants.”

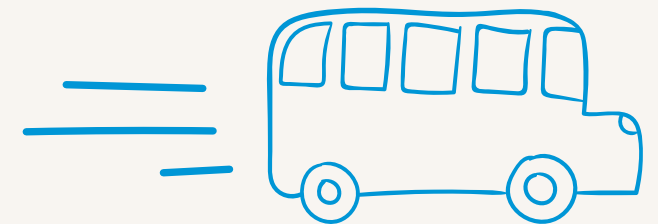

## PARTNERSHIPS

Earth Rangers has joined the Canadian Electric School Bus Alliance (CESBA), working with them to develop a new classroom program called Green Routes to the Future: Electric School Buses. The program is designed to amplify student voices in the growing movement towards emission-free transportation.



The Nature Education Collective (NEC) is a collaborative initiative between Earth Rangers, the Canadian Wildlife Federation, Ducks Unlimited Canada, Outward Bound Canada, and Project Learning Tree Canada. Together, we champion quality nature education for children and youth to ensure they become environmentally literate, sustainability-minded, and action-oriented individuals.





On May 29th 2023, the NEC hosted a meeting in Winnipeg, MB that brought together delegates from governments, ENGOs, formal and informal educators, and youth to talk about the future of nature education in Canada.

**RANGER KEELEY**, a level 78 Earth Ranger, joined our President to represent the voice of young people. Her commitment was truly an inspiration to everyone present!

# This year marks the first full year of Earth Rangers in the USA!

New families and partners across the US have welcomed Earth Rangers south of the border, helping to expand our reach and grow our impact. Since launching in the US, we have gained **over 7,000 new Earth Rangers with members from every state**, who have **completed over 16,300 Missions** and **logged 82,000 climate-friendly habits**, contributing significantly to Earth Rangers' overall success this year.

We also launched two brand new Wildlife Adoption projects with U.S. conservation partners:



**INTERNATIONAL BIRD RESCUE (IBR)** works to protect and advocate for the safety of water birds who can be threatened by oil spills and entanglement in fishing gear. IBR has response centers in California and Alaska where they treat sick and injured birds, with the goal of releasing them back into the wild.



**THE MARINE MAMMAL CENTER (MMC)** provides care to rescued animals like harbor seals, who may have been orphaned or separated from their mothers at a young age. Seal pups are protected and cared for until they are old enough to be released. MMC also conducts scientific research and offers educational programming.

2024 holds exciting opportunities to increase Earth Rangers' presence in the U.S. and make connections with new families, educators, and partners. For the first time ever, we will be piloting our School Assembly in Michigan in early 2024, with a brand new tech-forward version of the program!

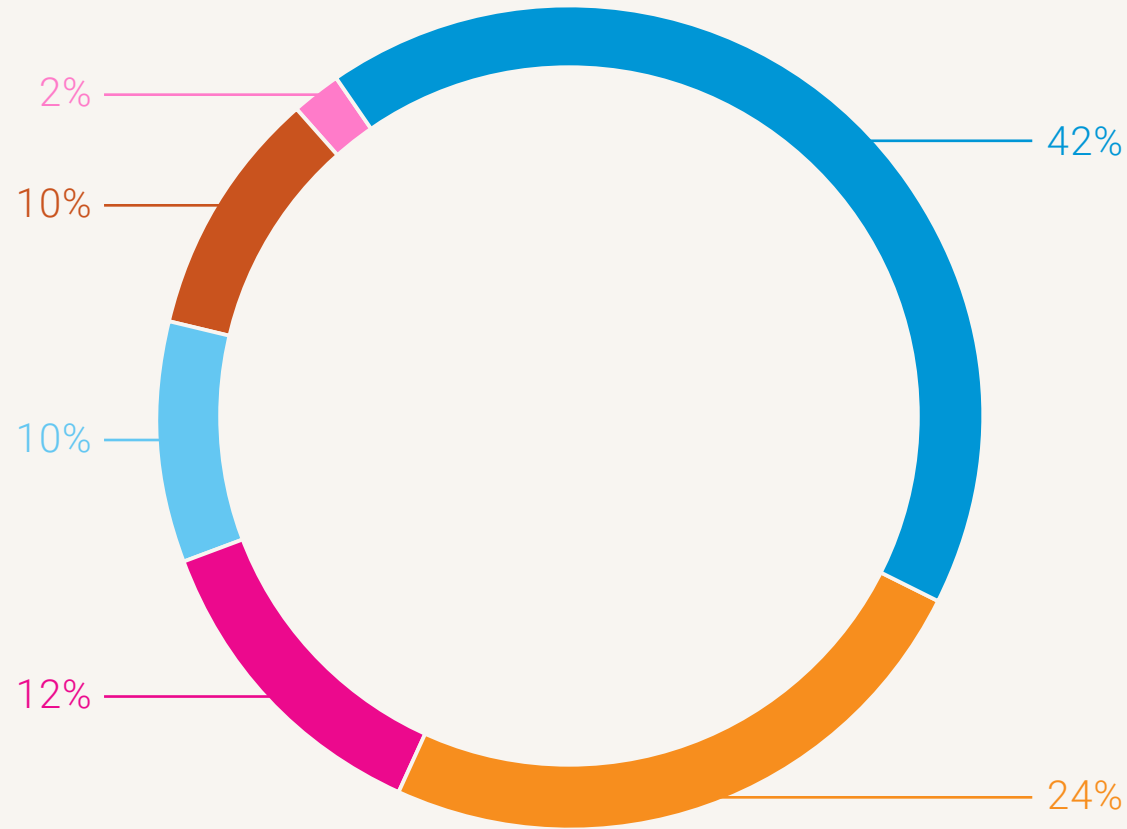

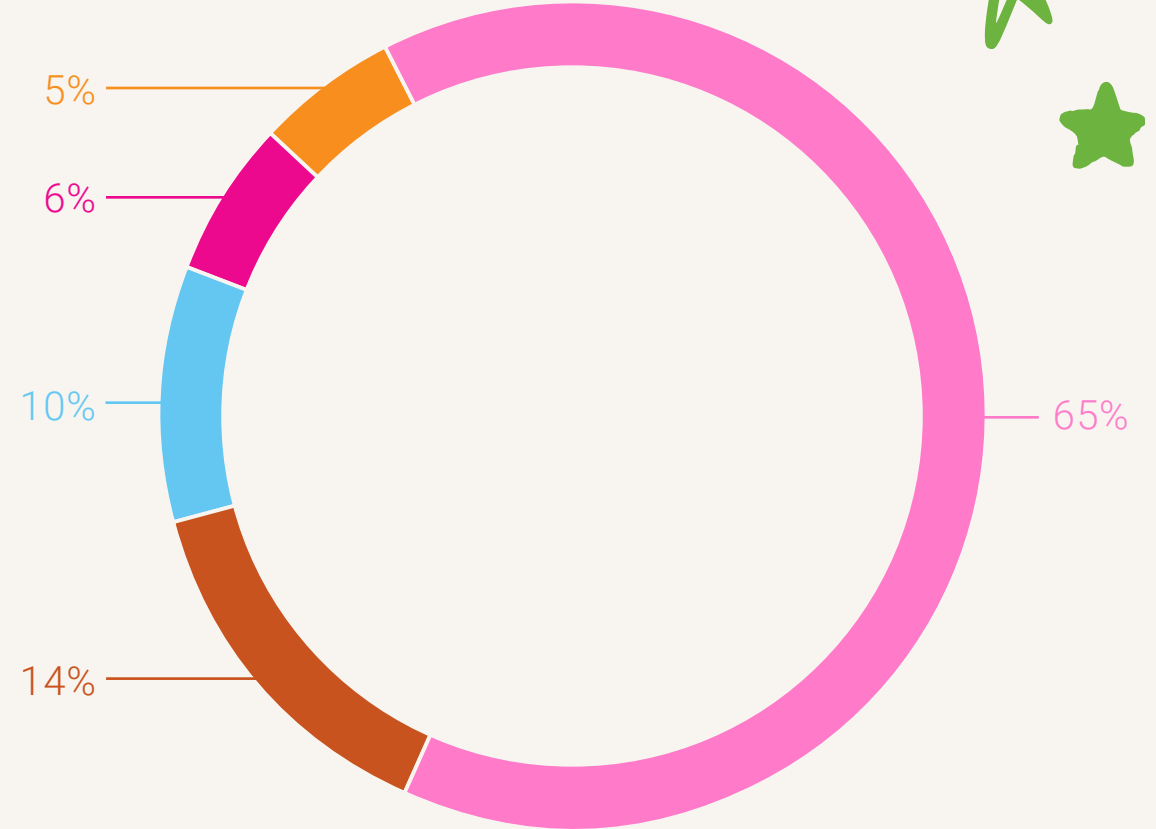
